Kyoto Filmmakers Lab (KFL) 2021-2022 was a development camp for young filmmakers all over the world as well as Japanese (official language was English). The program, called "Hands-on Jidaigeki," provided the participants with opportunities to make short *jidaigeki* (samurai period drama) films, using exactly the same facilities such as open sets, props, lights and wardrobes as being used for professional films. In addition, KFL had "Masters Session," the program collaborated with Tokyo International Film Festival (TIFF) this year. KFL team invited various lecturers from TIFF guests and juries for the program. Furthermore, we partnered with the Biennale College Cinema, which is a human resource development project of the Venice International Film Festival in 2018. Through these programs, we support to make network with young filmmakers for all over the world.

At the 14th Kyoto Filmmakers Lab this year, we didn't call for entry to who lives outside Japan in Handson Jidaigeki program because of the influence of spread out of covid-19. In addition, "Masters Session", co-sponsored by Tokyo International Film Festival, arranged the online program and we accepted the the participants who lives outside Japan. As one of the established main program, we provided the lecture with Biennale College Cinema (BCC), which is a human resource development project of the Venice International Film Festival. Concretely, a program staff, Ms. Valentina Bellomo gave a presentation on how participants should make films, which can attract attentions at international film festival, and on trends of Biennale College Cinema and how to apply through online system ZOOM.

In the online application, we separated 3 type of the participants. One is for Hands-on JIDAIGEKI, the targets are people who lives in Japan, second is Masters Session, the targets are people who lives in Japan and Third is Masters Session Online, the targets are people who lives out of Japan. All three types of application opened during July 21st to December 5th in 2021. Finally, 17 applicants(it contains the people who has the nationality of Switzerland(1), Spain(2), USA(3)) for Hands-on JIDAIGEKI and 44 applicants for Masters Session (it contains the 44 applicants from 18 countries and 10 applicants who lives in Japan), total 61 applicants from 16 countries and regions applied to the workshop through online application. As a result of selection, 16 participants (it contains 4 people who has foreign nationality lives in Japan) for Hands on JIDAIGEKI, and 43 participants (it contains 33 people who lives outside Japan and participate this program through online) for Masters Session were selected. The event was originally scheduled for 3 [Wed] - 7 [Sun] November 2021, but was postponed to 26 [Wed] - 30 [Sun] January 2022

in view of the spread of the COVID-19. As a result, the application period was from 21 [Wed] July to 23 [Thu] September, but the deadline has been extended to 5 [Sun] December.

<HANDS-ON JIDAIGEKI>

The four-day-program of making jidaigeki films which was held 3 days, 26 [Wed] - 28 [Fri] January 2022 at Toei Studios Kyoto, Shochiku Studios and The Museum of Kyoto. The program was held under the supervision of Mr. Kiyoto Ando (lighting professional) and Mr. Yutaka Mizoguchi (producer). Normally, the participants stayed together at ryokan(accommodation in Japanese style) in Uzumasa where is close to Toei and Shochiku Studios, but we cancelled training camp style and we let them arranged the accommodation by themselves for participants health and safety.

<MASTERS SESSION>

The three-day-program held 3 days, 28 [Fri] - 30 [Sun] January 2022 at The Museum of Kyoto and Kyu Butokuden (Old Kyoto Budo Centre). We had 11 sessions include sword action lecture presented by Toei Tsurugikai. Same as Hands-on Jidaigeki session, the participants arranged the accommodation by themselves for their health and safety. Among others, the [M3] Comeback Salmon Project was postponed to 11 March at a later date. For more information, see [M12].


